The NCCTRC was established following the 2002 Bali bombings and has since evolved to become a unique national asset that builds on Australia's strong history of humanitarian assistance. It is focused on enhancing Australia's health security and disaster response capacity in the Top End and is also active in building capacity and relationships across Asia and the Pacific.

The NCCTRC provides a combination of readily adaptable and innovative response capabilities; training; teaching; exercising expertise; research initiatives; and mentoring and support for emerging medical teams across the Asia—Pacific.

The NCCTRC relocated from Royal Darwin Hospital to the Darwin International Airport in May 2019, delegates will be taken on a guided tour of the new facilities.

Museum and Art Gallery NT

The Museum and Art Gallery of the Northern Territory (MAGNT) is the Northern Territory's premier cultural organisation.

Set in a scenic location overlooking the Arafura Sea in Darwin, MAGNT is home to internationally renowned artistic, cultural and scientific collections and research programs.

Each year MAGNT presents a dynamic program of internally-developed exhibitions, carefully curated from the collection, and the best travelling exhibitions from around Australia.

It is also the home of the annual <u>Telstra National Aboriginal and Torres Strait</u> <u>Islander Art Awards (NATSIAA)</u>- the most significant celebration of its kind in Australia, this exhibition is currently on and showcasing the very best Australian Indigenous art from around the country.

Delegates will have free time to wander around the Museum immersing oneself in exhibitions of interest, whether it be the 36th Telstra NATSIAA, Between the Moon and the Stars- where Science and art come together to reveal the influence of the stars, the Moon and its phases, the cyclone Tracey exhibition or see MAGNT's most famous resident, "Sweetheart the crocodile".
